Notes from the President

Learning to understand each other

By the time you read this it will be warm and sunny, the trees will be budding and the spring flowers will be starting to blossom. At least, that's my hope.

Despite my love of snow and cold weather, I do understand how hard this winter has been on those who don't share my enthusiasm. Most people have been complaining about how awful the winter has been, and they can't wait until the

warm up begins. They can't believe that anyone in their right mind would enjoy the snowy cold weather. Soon enough things will turn very warm, the grass will grow so much that it should be cut at least twice a week, but the severe thunderstorms will make it impossible to cut the grass before it becomes a jungle, and people will be complaining about the heat. Learning the true meaning of Tzedakah

On April 6, we will be participating in and conducting Passover events in two different locations. We will begin the day by everyone meeting for Religious School at the usual time. The PreK, Kindergarten, 1st and 2nd grades will be having a Passover program and model Seder at the Synagogue. The older students, grades 3-7 will carpool over to the JCC for a special Passover program with Rahel Musleah. Hers is an interactive program of songs and activities, designed for our older students. It will bring the Exodus story to life. Rahel Musleah was born in Calcutta, India, the seventh generation of a Calcutta Jewish family that traces its

roots to 17th century Baghdad. Her haggadah, "Why On This Night: A Passover Haggadah for Family Celebration," has received critical acclaim. Please speak to your child's teacher if you are interested in joining us and can help drive.

Towards the end of this month, we will be sending out Religious School registration forms for the 2003-2004 school year. Please return these as soon as possible. Having these forms in hand better enables us to plan our classes, hire any necessary teachers, purchase books and resources and be more prepared in the long run.

Our combined PreK/Kindergarten class meets twice a month. Their morning is filled with art, music with our

student cantor (whenever possible) or music in the class, stories, services, mitzvah projects, snack and social time. It is a great introduction to some basic Judaic concepts, holidays, mitzvot, the synagogue and more. If you have a child who will be in Kindergarten beginning in 2004 (and 1st in 2005), we would be delighted to have him or her join us this September. someone else extreme discomfort, I would be committing a sin.

There are often situations, from which we need to step back and realize that someone else might be very uncomfortable, while we are perfectly happy.

One such situation is how we behave in the synagogue. Some members believe that a service is a time for structured prayer and song, and there should be little or no extraneous noise. Other members believe that there is nothing wrong with extra noise.

What is important here is to

understand how the other person feels. Is it fair to the person who expects to pray in a quiet place, to endure constant talking, crying, running and stomping around the sanctuary? And is it fair to the parents of small children to expect them to keep their children perfectly quiet? There needs to be an understanding of the needs of each group.

A sanctuary is a place where people are welcome to gather in a safe environment. We need to respect each person who enters our house. We encourage bringing small children to services, but if they get antsy or loud, please take them to the babysitter. We

are considering setting up some tables and chairs in the gallery for those whose children do not want to go to the sitter, but want to be with you. You will be able to sit in that area, still participate in the service, yet allow your child some freedom to walk around without disturbing others in the main sanctuary.

We ask adults and teenagers to refrain from constant conversation throughout the service. Otherwise you'll have nothing to talk about after services.

You don't have to be crazy to respect each other's needs!

Students remember the Holocaust

The 7th grade Religious School class has been studying the Holocaust. The following Holocaust poems were read by the students at the Jan. 24 Shabbat service.

"First they Came for the Jews"

In Germany they first came for the Communists and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a Communist. Then they came for the Jews, and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a Jew. Then they came for the trade unionists and I didn't speak up because I wasn't a trade unionist. Then they came for the Catholics and I didn't speak up because I was a Protestant. Then they came for me and by that time no one was left to speak up.

"I'd like to go alone"

I'd like to go away alone
Where there are other, nicer people,
Somewhere into the far unknown,
There, where no one kills another.

Maybe more of us,
A thousand strong,
Will reach this goal
Before too long.

This poem was written by Alena Synkova who was born in Prague in 1926. She wrote the poem in pencil on a yellow scrap of paper while she was at the Terezin Concentration Camp. She was 16 when she wrote this poem. Alena Synkova was liberated from the

camp and returned home to Prague.

"The Butterfly"

The last, very the last,
So richly, brightly, dazzling yellow.
Perhaps if the sun's tears
would sing

Against a white stone...

Such, such a yellow
Is carried lightly 'way up high.
It went away I'm sure because it
wished to

kiss the world goodbye.
For seven weeks I've lived in here,
Penned up inside this ghetto
But I have found my people here.
The dandelions call to me
And the white chestnut candles in the
court.
Only I never saw another butterfly.

That butterfly was the last one.
Butterflies don't live in here,
In the ghetto.

This poem was written by Pavel Friedman in June, 1942. He was born in Prague in 1921 and sent to Terezin in 1942. He died in a concentration camp in 1944. His poems can be seen in the National Jewish Museum.

"Riddle"

From Belsen a crate of gold teeth,
From Dachau a mountain of shoes,
From Auschwitz a skin lampshade.
Who killed the Jews?

Not I, cries the typist,
Not I, cries the engineer,
Not I, cries Adlf Eichmann,
Not I, cries Albert Sper.

My friend Fritz Nova lost his father –
A petty official had to choose.
My friend Lou Abrams lost his brother.
Who killed the Jews?

David Nova swallowed gas,
Hyman Abrahs was beaten and
starved.

Some men signed their papers,
And some stood guard,
And some herded them in,
And some dropped the pellets,
And some spread the ashes,
And some hosed the walls,
And some planted the wheat,
And some poured the steel,
And some cleared the rails,
And some raised the cattle.
Some smelled the smoke,
Some just heard the news.

Were they Germans? Were they
Nazis?

Were they human? Who killed the
Jews?

The stars will remember the gold,
The sun will remember the shoes,
The moon will remember the skin,
But who killed the Jews?
