Many of you may have noticed that we have recently begun saying a prayer for the sick each Shabbat. This is a tradition that dates back many years. Whenever the community was gathered for prayer, and the Torah was read, a special prayer was added asking for God to heal all who were sick. Today, when we think of illness and healing, we include all those who are in need of either physical

or spiritual healing.

In the ancient world, one of the purposes of a synagogue was to spread news about its members and those important to the community. Unfortunately, today's litigious society and privacy regulations at the hospitals and other care facilities prevent us from sharing most the information that comes through the Temple office. However, we would be very happy to include either

your own name or the name of a loved one who is in need of healing. Simply call Lynn in the Temple office and ask to have their name added to the list.

I would like to ask, however, that you please take the feelings of those receiving the blessing into account. Some people are very private and they do not want information of their illness to be shared with the general community. Therefore, it is always a good idea to ask the person's permission, if possible, before adding their name to the list. As a congregation and an extended Jewish community, we have an obligation to guard the dignity and privacy of each member. Be that as it may, we, also, have a strong desire to

Religious School News

Never too late and giving thanks

So you never became a Bar or Bat Mitzvah? That is not a problem. While we tend to focus on this meaningful and important ceremony at the traditional age of 13, no one said you cannot become one later in life. I was fifteen and a half. My mother, who grew up in a Conservative congregation and went through confirmation, was thirty-eight. Shirley Jacobs had hers two months ago and she is, well...you get the picture. You can be next. It is not too late to speak to Rabbi Michelson and join this year's class.

In a Jewish classroom, we spend a great deal of time learning about and celebrating Jewish Holidays. However, there are often disagreements about if,

and how secular or North American holidays should be observed or noted. Some of these holidays are relevant and appropriate for our Jewish classrooms; others are not. Thanksgiving is perhaps the most pertinent to the Jewish classroom and to us as a people. One popular belief is that the Pilgrims modeled their Thanksgiving on the biblical holiday of Sukkot. The traditions inherent in Thanksgiving include gathering together with family, eating lots of food, and taking time to appreciate what we have, all elements of many Jewish holidays. Use this time to discuss with your children, where they, you and your family came from. In some way, at some time, someone in each of our families came to America. And, as you

sit down to Thanksgiving dinner, every family that has had the opportunity to explore these stories will have a deeper sense of just why we are so thankful to be America.

The future of Reform Judaism is up to you

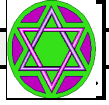
Ultra-Orthodox politicians are threatening Jewish unity and Jewish continuity.

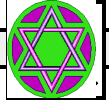

have changed in our lives. None of us could have imagined the events that occurred in New York, Washington, D. C., and in western Pennsylvania. On a more personal level I had not imagined becoming President so soon, yet it is a position I have now assumed.

I feel blessed to have the opportunity to be one of the leaders of this Temple. The Temple has always been an important place in my life. My parents' core group of friends went to the Temple. Many happy events were celebrated at the Temple. My formal Jewish education was begun at the Temple. My first encounter with social action on a community level was through the Temple. It has been a place to grow.

The founders of Oheb Sholom stated, "the purpose of the Congregation shall be to promote Reform Judaism in all aspects of life, by means of public and private worship, by proper instruction in the religious school and from the pulpit, and by such other

means and methods as may be appropriate to advance the cause of liberal Judaism."

Some may ask why promote Reform Judaism. What does the Reform movement stand for? Rabbi Eric Yoffe, President of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, the governing body of Reform Judaism, has come up with a list of Reform commitments, and these are:

1. "Commitment to a Judaism that changes and adapts to the needs of the times", thus the name Reform.
2. "Commitment to the absolute equality of women in all areas of Jewish life." We were the first to ordain women Rabbis and Cantors, and we have encouraged women to serve as leaders.
3. "Commitment to social justice" - and to overcome injustice. We have been in the forefront in our community to improve race relations. And we need to continue to stand up against bigotry and narrow-mindedness.

4. "Commitment to the principle of inclusion." In order to create a caring community we must look at how to include most people instead of how to exclude them.
5. "Commitment to a true partnership" between the Rabbi and the membership. We need to work together as a team, respecting each other's strong points and nurturing each other's weaknesses.

Things have changed in our daily lives, but the commitments of Reform Judaism have remained constant. We need to gather strength from each other and from our Jewish roots. We must work together so the next generations understand the importance of our teachings.

The future of the Temple and Reform Judaism is in our hands. We have built a beautiful building, and now we must fill it with a beautiful spirit. Make a commitment to creating this spirit by coming to services, joining a class, working on an existing committee, or developing something new.

Congregant shares views on "B.C." strip

Congregant Nancy Knoblauch wrote the following letter to "B.C." cartoonist Johnny Hart, and she asked that it be reprinted in the bulletin. She had not received a response from Hart as of press time.

Dear Mr. Hart

For quite some time — since April — I've been meaning to write to you. There was quite a stir over the cartoon you drew at Easter/Passover time. Surely you will recall. Our local newspaper ran the strip as well as an article that focused on the controversy it stirred — principally the outrage it provoked in the Jewish community, and on your protestations that

no offense was intended.

The article in our paper quoted you as having said in response to your critics, "I regret if some people misunderstood the strip, and it hurt their feelings. I abhor the so-called 'Replacement Theology.' This is a holy week for both Christians and Jews, and my intent, as always, was to pay tribute to both."

I applaud your abhorance of Replacement Theology, but I am still at a loss to understand in what way you thought your drawings gave equal honor to both faiths. Even if I weren't Jewish, I think I'd still be puzzled. But I take people at their word. If you say your intention was to honor both, then I believe

that was your intention, but I still don't see how.

Please believe me when I say this is not a hostile letter. I am honestly interested in knowing how it looked to you. I suppose there's little question in your mind as to the way it looked to the Jewish community.

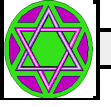
